Common name

Aromatic peppercress, Basalt peppercress, Peppercress

Family

Brassicaceae

Where found

Woodland, grassland, gardens, and disturbed sites. ACT and tablelands. Liverpool to Tahmoor. Occasionally elsewhere.

Notes

Perennial herb to 0.50 m tall, finely bristly or hairless. Leaves basal and alternating up the stems, bases sometimes auriculate. Basal leaves to 10 cm long, fern-like and deeply dissected with linear lobes, or the margins toothed. Stem leaves alternating up the stems, to 4 cm long, 1-2.5 mm wide, becoming smaller up the stems, margins toothed or entire. Flowers greenish, small, with 4 sepals 0.5–0.8 mm long and 4 tiny petals or 0 petals. Flowers in an unbranched cluster which elongates in seed. Flowers mostly summer-autumn. Seed cases oval to narrow-elliptic, sometimes hairy, 2-5 mm long, 1.5-2.5 mm wide, with narrow wings in the upper half, and a small notch at the tips. (needs a hand lens or a macro app on your phone/tablet to see.) Stalks of seed cases hairy, 2-5 mm long, spreading.

Endangered Australia. Endangered NSW. Provisions of the NSW Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 No 63 relating to the protection of protected plants generally also apply to plants that are a threatened species.
